Jobs and Employers for Humanities Majors: An Incomplete Draft List

Employers interested in interns are marked with an asterisk. Some information may be inaccurate, some relevant positions may not be listed here, some employers may decide not to show up. This is enough information to get you started, but you should look at the company's listing on Handshake and their website in order to plan your career fair strategy.

Note that some companies will be at the fair on Wednesday, the 18th; others will be there Thursday, the 19th. No companies will be there BOTH days. **Make sure the companies you want to talk to will be there on the day you plan to attend.**

Companies that aren't on this list have come to the Gies Fair to recruit for specific skills (particularly in accounting and finance), which they will name in their Handshake profile. You can talk to employers not on this list – you may have noticed jobs relevant to your skills on the company's website but not on Handshake. Note, however, that it may not be a productive conversation – but it's because the recruiter is focused on specific recruiting goals that don't include your skills, not because you wouldn't be a good fit for the company. .

Account Services/Client Services/Relationship Management/Sales

Many entry-level jobs have a sales component to them -- but be aware that a lot of different kinds of jobs are folded into this umbrella term. Some involve cold-calling individual customers, others involve managing relationships with the representatives of companies that are established customers, some focus more on background activities like gathering data and solving problems than on direct customer engagement. For some companies, ALL entry-level employees start in sales; for others it's one of many points of entry. Being able to communicate well, listen to people so that they feel heard, and build relationships are key skills here.
